In the month of July my husband got sick, was in the hospital and that's how my life was.

Interviewer: So, when did you immigrate here?

When it was that I come to America?

Interviewer: Yeah.

I came to América on the 11th of June of 1976.

Interviewer: To New Bedford, Fall River?

To New Bedford. I was always in New Bedford.

Interviewer: Always?

Always. I worked at Cliftex.

Interviewer: Cliftex?

At Cliftex. I always worked there. Never knew another factory. When the factory closed that's when I retired. The factory closed, and I came home. There was only a few months left to take my retirement and I didn't go look for another job, I was collecting.

Interviewer: At Cliftex, you made dresses?

Was, my first job there was to turn vests, right side out, men's vests. After that style ended, I went to another job. I came to Jackets. In jackets, my life was to cut the threads. After I went to check the Jackets before they went out to the stores. Had to see if they had defects. And after I was putting plastic coverts on the jackets so they could go out. And now, I have my kids all married. My husband died already. I live alone.

Interviewer: You live alone in?

I live alone in New Bedford.

Interviewer: And the children live where?

I have a daughter in North Carolina. And my sons are here. I pair of sons that I have here.

Interviewer: You got some grandchildren?

Ai, I have two grandsons and one granddaughter.

Interviewer: Here in New Bedford or in North Carolina?

I have a granddaughter in North Carolina and I have two grandsons here in New Bedford. But my grandson does not work here in New Bedford. I have one that works here in New Bedford. The other one lives in Connecticut, works in Connecticut.

Interviewer: Are you a member of a church?

Yeah, my church is the Mount Carmel Church. I live close to that church. I walk there. The church is near my house and I walk to church. Yeah, I really live close. Even without me having a car—I never drove in this country. Never drove.

Interviewer: You never drove?

No, no. My sister-in-law always took me to work. Because she worked in the factory I worked at.

Interviewer: You come here every Tuesday?

Yes on Tuesdays, and there are days that I can't come. But when I can, I always come here on Tuesday. On Thursdays I don't come. Because on Thursdays we also have one at the Mount Carmel Church. We have a program like this. It's on Thursday now in the summer. But in the winter, when it's cold we don't. On Thursday then I stay at the church and on Tuesday I come here.

Interviewer: So, you have girlfriends?

Yeah, yeah, yeah.

Interviewer: When you come here, what do you do? Cards?

Cards. I like to play cards very much. Because, it's my pastime, because I am alone in the house, it feels good. And here my distraction is with my friends.

Interviewer: I just learned a new word in Portuguese: Cards, for activity.

Cards, yes. Cards. I don't know another card game. It's donkey. The game of donkey all the cards value is the same.

Interviewer: Anything else you want to talk about?

I have nothing more.

Interviewer: So, I think you ladies have snacks over there. So we can finish. Great.
